BUILDING COMMUNIST LEADERSHIP AT BOEING

SEATTLE, WA--"The union just waits for the company to attack and then reacts," complained a Machinist and *Red Flag* distributor to the candidate for the International Association of Machinists (IAM) Boeing district president. "The union has no strategy."

"The union doesn't have--and cannot have--any answer to the crisis of capitalism," added a comrade. "In fact, they are part of the system."

"You got that right!" agreed a third.

There are 33,000 workers in the IAM Boeing union. Three people--from the select few dozen that are eligible--are running for president in a special election March 6th. The past president resigned after the contract extension debacle.

No candidate ventures outside the confines of trade union philosophy. Each candidate tries to outdo the other crying for more democracy and to stand up to the company. None, however, can come up with a convincing plan to address the bosses' assault.

"The only plan that can work is to grow the International Communist Workers' Party (ICWP) in order to mobilize the masses for communism," a party member argued.

"I'm sick of the whole joke," agreed a fourth, a friendly union official who distributes a few of our papers. "Your plan is the only one that makes sense."

If this plan makes sense, now is the time to join. Mobilizing the Masses for Communism requires the active participation of every *Red Flag* reader and friend.

Will Unions or Communist Union Leaders Make Workers Better Off?

This friendly union official was

bombarded with demands that he support the establishment candidate. He refused.

"So they're threatening your career in the union," observed a comrade.

"Who cares!" he answered emphatically. This from a worker who has spent many years trying to be a principled, honest, anti-racist union leader.

Then we got to talking about unions and union leaders. We both agreed the Tennessee autoworkers (see box page 4) would be no better off if they had a union and certainly not if they had a joint company-union "workers" council.

He has often said the union would be better off if some of our comrades led it. This time our comrade argued, "It wouldn't matter."

"Unions are reform organizations. They are forced to be part of the capitalist system. We need a different kind of organization. We need a bigger ICWP. We need a party to mobilize the masses for communism."

"That sounds about right!" he admitted in front of friends.

Communist Political Leadership

When a fifth worker who distributes more papers heard about this conversation, he had some questions.

"I understand winning official union positions is not the goal. It's like the government. Democrat or Republican, it is still the same system. That's why I told my daughter I don't vote anymore.

"Even if someone got in to do good for workers, they would be hemmed in by capitalism.

"But that doesn't mean we don't need leadership, does it?"

Russian, European, US Imperialists Fight over Ukraine

WORLD'S WORKERS MUST MOBILIZE FOR COMMUNISM TO DESTROY DEADLY CAPITALISM

Russia's military occupation of Crimea is a grim reminder that inter-imperialist rivalry inevitably leads to war. Imperialist war is a sick solution for a deadly system mired in a crisis of overproduction, which it can only resolve by destroying the productive capacity of rival imperialists: factories and workers.

Only communist revolution can end capitalism's uncontrollable and never-ending environmental destruction and its impoverishment and mass murder of the international working class.

Communism will eliminate money and wage slavery, the causes of corruption, exploitation and imperialist war. The working class as a whole, united worldwide through its communist party, will decide what's best for everyone and how we can produce everything that every human needs to live a decent and better life.

Ukrainian Workers Sink into Deeper Suffering and Misery

The current political crisis began when corrupt Ukrainian ex-President Yanukovich rejected closer ties to the European Union, instead accepting Putin's offer of a \$15 billion loan.

That triggered mass demonstrations. Violent police repression fueled the protests, which grew to 100,000 people. They evolved from wanting closer EU ties to demanding regime change. The US and the European Union embraced the

demonstrations, which included nazi nationalists, as another "flowering of democracy."

Like all capitalists, Ukrainian bosses increase their profits by exploiting and stealing from the working class. Rinat Akhmetov and Victor Pinchuk, two of the wealthiest Ukrainians, have accumulated their wealth (estimated at over \$30 billion) from the blood of Ukrainian workers. They are loyal only to their money and can easily swing to the imperialist master that can better protect their interest.

Workers in Ukraine are fed up with these capitalist conditions. They are frustrated, because under capitalism their lives will not get better no matter who runs the country. But many have dangerous illusions in "better" imperialists.

Ukraine and Russia: Trade, Energy, and Strategic Location

Russia threatened Ukraine with trade consequences if the country signed the EU deal, and suspended \$15 billion in aid. As protests escalated, the pro-Russian Yanukovich fled. A provisional pro-Western government was formed, composed of three parties, including open fascists. Ukraine, facing economic collapse, is looking to the EU and the International Monetary Fund for help.

The opposition, led by pro-western bosses, tells workers that joining the EU will better their lives, but any imperialist aid or loans will impose harsh conditions that will enslave Ukrainian workers even more to the capitalist system, as happened in Greece.

The fight to exploit Ukrainian workers reflects the worldwide fight for profits and empire among the major imperialist powers.

For the US, EU and Russian imperialists, the suffering of the working class is the least of their concerns. All they want is to control strategic regions to be well-positioned for the inevitable World War III.

The Ukraine is of huge strategic importance to Russia. Geographically it is an easy route for invading armies. If controlled by western powers, Russia's southern flank would be wide open. Russia will not allow this.

Ukraine's Crimean peninsula (now occupied by Russia) is home to one of Russia's main naval bases, allowing Russia to dominate the Black Sea and to project power to the Mediterranean Sea.

Imperialists Inch Closer to World War

The Ukrainian crisis shows the limits of imperialists' soft power: diplomacy and economic bribery. These are normally used against vassals



or rivals to force concessions. When these are exhausted, war is the imperialists' only option.

Thus, when the new Ukrainian regime rejected Putin's diplomatic overtures and economic offer, his only option was military intervention.

Putin's move smashed the US bosses' illusions that strategic Ukraine could easily be plucked from him and used to encircle Russia militarily and curtail its aspirations for greater global power.

Now the decline of US influence has been exposed. Germany, not the US, is positioned to broker peace negotiations. "Short of war there is little that the US can do on its own to punish Russia," editorialized the *New York Times* (3/5/14).

European Union Is Divided over Ukraine

Poland and some other countries support the US agenda. In contrast, Germany's agenda is to bring Ukraine closer to Europe in order to bring Russia closer to Europe too.

The German bloc sees China as its main rival for markets, energy and other natural resources. It plans to stem Russia's pivot to Asia and its possible military alliance with China.

This bloc realizes that its soft power is no longer effective. Its economic aid is losing impact because of bigger donors (like China). Economic power alone is not enough in Asia.

The German bloc sees the US increasingly as a rival. A policy paper issued by the European Council of Foreign Relations emphasized, "Europe cannot leave Asian security to the US," allowing the US to dominate the Asia-Pacific region.

The European Foreign Affairs chief argued that a stronger European defense policy must be "threefold: political, ensuring that the EU can live up to its global ambitions; operational, giving Europe the capacity to act on the ground; and economic."

In short, the world's imperialists are preparing for future wars while babbling about peace. Ukrainian workers and the masses everywhere should realize the only solution to all their problems is not a new government or capitalist democracy but rather a communist revolution to destroy the capitalist system for ever.

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Sweep out Garbage: Bosses and Politicians

BUILD ICWP IN BRAZIL AND EVERYWHERE



Fabricio Chaves, a 22 year old youth, was among thousands of protesters in São Paulo, Brazil, who had gathered to protest the billions of dollars the bosses are spending for the World Cup while tens of millions of people struggle to survive deteriorating living conditions. A group of Military Police (MP) surrounded Fabricio and, as eye-witnesses reported, the MPs were yelling “Mata, Mata!” (Kill, Kill!). Fabricio was bleeding profusely; the police refused the ambulance access to the site. After a long delay, Fabricio was taken to a hospital and under heavy sedatives the police got a “confession” from him saying that he was injured because the police acted in self-defense. Moments later he died. A group of lawyers who tried to represent Fabricio’s family received death threats.



The rulers in Brazil are scared that youth and workers will bring their anger and fury to the streets of Brazil during the World Cup. The bosses have every reason to lose sleep. The majority of the workers in Brazil are black. They have faced centuries of racism and are fed up with the system. Fabricio Chaves joins Fernandão, Amarildo, and Diaz – all black youth killed in demonstrations in February. To construct freeways, stadiums and parking structures,

over 350,000 families, most of them black, were left homeless as MPs with guns and bulldozers flattened their homes.

The bosses are desperately attempting to contain the simmering anger of these black workers by portraying black youth as criminals or gang members, and by sending in MPs every night with helicopters and mounted police to terrorize favelas (poor neighborhoods) where the black workers live. This systematic brutal racism against black workers traces its roots to slavery imposed by the Portuguese capitalists who imported to Brazil 87% of the slaves brought to the Americas.

However, the working class in Brazil is not taking these attacks passively. A massive wildcat strike by the street sweepers in the Sanitation Workers’ Union in Rio de Janeiro is still going on. The workers defied the union misleaders. What started as a strike for better wages has now taken a direction that has the potential to threaten the very existence of the bosses and their profit system. The wildcat strikers are confronting cops and blockading freeways. Slogans are emerging that say, “We only collect garbage; the only garbage is the bosses and their politicians.” (see photo)

The striking street sweepers were joined by 30,000 petroleum workers employed by Rio de Janeiro Petrochemical Complex (COMPERJ). These workers make less than \$200 a month, and work long hours in dangerous conditions. They go hungry for days in offshore rigs. There is no sanitation, and health care is nonexistent when they get injured. Hungry for change, these workers organized their strike against the wishes of the union. They occupied freeways, costing the bosses’ economy over \$25 million a day. This power to threaten the bosses’ profits emboldened more workers to occupy freeways. On the third day of the strike, the bosses and the union mafia fired on the workers, killing two.

Brazil’s economy is largely dependent on providing minerals and other natural resources to China. Due to the crisis of overproduction in China, its trade with Brazil is declining. The workers in Brazil are being forced to pay for this crisis. However, as witnessed by the massive demonstrations by the youth and the constant waves of wildcat strikes, the working class is in motion for change.

Last May and June, masses took to the streets, first demanding that a new fare increase not be implemented and then demanding free transportation for all. In Sao Paulo and Rio, youth opened the metro gates, as a mass tactic to let workers into the transit system free.

When youth massively organize to make transportation free for all and workers think of the bosses as garbage, we can see that they want a different society.

Our party has a huge opportunity to spread the seeds of revolutionary change in Brazil. Communism will bury the bosses and we will build a society based on the needs of the working class. *Red Flag* readers in Brazil need to take leadership and join ICWP, just like the workers in South Africa and in El Salvador. Our anger at the capitalist system which murdered Fabricio Alves in Brazil, massacred miners in South Africa, and murdered masses of Bangladeshi garment workers must be converted into building ICWP with renewed energy and determination.

DON'T BEG FOR JUSTICE, FIGHT FOR WORKERS' POWER

LOS ANGELES, February 26—On the second anniversary of the murder of Trayvon Martin, ICWP participated in a march against the racist murder of black youth. We distributed the following leaflet linking Trayvon Martin’s murder to that of Jordan Davis. Two years ago, Davis was in a car with three friends outside a convenience store in Jacksonville, Florida when Michael Dunn parked and yelled at the youth to turn down their music. When they turned it down and then back up, Dunn shot his gun ten times at the youth and their car, murdering 17-year-old African American Jordan Davis at point blank range.

“This isn’t a black and white issue; it’s a subcultural thug issue” was the statement of Michel Dunn’s attorney after Dunn’s trial for the murder of black teenager Jordan Davis. After the “loud music” trial in Florida was finished Dunn was convicted of everything but the murder of Jordan Davis, leaving many people to question if justice was served. Last year’s Trayvon Martin trial was another case where a young man was gunned

down due to nothing more than the color of his skin. What do these racist attacks on working class children mean?

Under the capitalist system, racism and stereotyping of young black men as “more prone to violence” or “thugs” are some of many racist messages perpetuated in the media and instilled in the minds of people like George Zimmerman

and Michael Dunn. These issues go way deeper than Florida’s controversial stand-your-ground Law. Racism is a tool used to serve the needs of the bosses by making workers of one “race” and/or background think that they are superior to another.

Jordan Davis’ parents’ response to the verdict was “we do not accept a law that would allow collateral damage to our family.” Reducing the lives of black youth to collateral damage is doing the same thing that the US has been doing to children who die daily in wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

What people need to understand is that we will never have true justice until we abolish this system. We need a revolution that will do away with racism, wage slavery, police, and wannabes like Zimmerman or Dunn and the only way that can happen is by organizing Black, white, Latino, Asian and all our working-class brothers and sisters in the ICWP. Only after a communist revolution will children who have been killed from the Middle East to Florida and from Emmett Till to Jordan Davis, the latest victim of this capitalist system, have true justice.



U.C. Workers:**ONLY COMMUNISM, NOT TRADE UNIONISM, WILL ELIMINATE POVERTY**

“Victory! Service workers reach historic tentative agreement,” screams the headline on the web page of AFSCME local 3299. This is the result of 18 months of negotiations between the University of California system and the union representing 8,300 campus service workers.

The four-year agreement includes a 4.5% wage increase paid two months after ratification. For two years these workers had no pay raise and this first raise will not increase their take home pay because it will go to pay for pensions and retiree health care. Currently employees contribute 5 percent of their wages to such fund. The new contract raises it to 9.5 percent.

The agreement also calls for a 3 percent wage increase for 2014 through 2016 and a 2 percent step increase each of those years until employees reach their position’s top pay. Some might need one, two or three steps to get there. The ratification bribe was a \$200 bonus.

The union calls it a 20 percent wage hike. But, it is only 9% for those at top pay and 11%, 13%, and 15% for others, depending on what step they are at.

However, if we factor in the US official inflation rate of 2% and the unofficial one of at least 8%, we get a different picture:

With a 2% annual inflation, this “historic” wage increase is reduced to a meager 3% for those at top pay and 5%, 7%, and 9% for those with step increases. But, using the 8% unofficial inflation rate, which is much more real, it becomes a pay cut of 15% for those at top pay, and 13%, 11% and 9% cut for those with steps increases.

This is a far cry from what AFSCME 3299 President Kathryn Lybarger triumphantly hails as “a historic agreement with UC that will pull thousands of its full-time employees out of poverty.”

According to Lybarger, “99 percent of the UC service workers... (making an average salary of

\$36,000 per year) are income eligible for some form of public assistance.” If anything, the contract will inflate their salary (not their purchasing power), which will make them ineligible for public assistance, while increasing their taxes.

Although UC had last year record profits of hundreds of millions of dollars, the workers benefits “... will be paid for with revenue from auxiliary enterprises on UC campuses, including student housing, parking and food services,” said a UC spokeswoman.

This is a blatant attempt to divide these workers from the students and faculty, who will pay more for these services. But, workers’ parking and food will also go up.

Capitalism can’t give us a fair wage or dignity

Capitalism exists to make the bosses profits by paying us less than what we produce. Thus, no matter how much they pay us, we would still be exploited, and wage slaves subjected to the bosses’ racist disciplinary actions, suspensions and firings.

To keep us exploited, the capitalists pay us just a subsistence wage, barely enough to keep us alive so that we can continue to work and raise the next generation of wage slaves. Wages are the chains that bind us to the capitalists.

As their worldwide economic crisis deepens, the bosses worldwide are grinding tens of millions of workers into the most crushing poverty. However, the millions of our class brothers and sisters in open rebellion against these attacks show our potential to fight for a different world.

The alternative to the bosses’ wage slavery is Communism. In communism, we will all contribute with our brains and hands to collectively plan and build a world that meets our needs. Communism will not have bosses, wage slavery or money. We will all gladly lend a hand to produce what workers need, not for a pay check but because it will make all our lives better.

To achieve this, we need to join and help build a mass ICWP, and spread *Red Flag* to more workers, students, teachers, and soldiers so that they help mobilize the masses for communism.

**Impotency Of Trade Union Politics Visible Across the U.S.**

Volkswagen workers in Chattanooga, Tenn. rejected the United Auto Workers (UAW) last month, 712 to 626.

Volkswagen supported the union because the company wanted a joint company-union “workers” council in the plant. All other 105 Volkswagen plants around the world have them. It needed a union to establish this council according to U.S. law.

The UAW was more than willing to go along. The union campaign praised this council because it “would increase productivity” (i.e. speed-up and fewer jobs). With friends like these, who needs enemies?

Various politicians from Tennessee came out against unionization. Their scare tactics worked when they pointed to Detroit, blaming the union for the loss of jobs and wages there. The UAW hogtied the working class with concession after

concession, while at the same time, the capitalists decimated the city. Just like the IAM, when the crisis hit they sprang into action to save the bosses and their system.

Trade unionism has shown its true colors during this crisis of capitalism. Mobilizing the masses for communism has been pushed to the top of the agenda.

“Of course not,” answered our comrade. “We need communist political leadership on the shop floor and in the streets among the masses of workers. Our tactics must serve that purpose.”

“Look,” continued our friend. “Everywhere in the world people are revolting. It’s already come here a little bit. It will come to this country in a big way.”

“You’re right! Masses are revolting. The key question is: are they aimed at a real solution? Are they aiming at a communist revolution?”

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South Africa:

ORGANIZE POLITICAL STRIKES FOR COMMUNIST POWER

On the eve of the World War I, in South Africa as in the rest of the world, there was tremendous ferment among sections of the workers and oppressed. At the same time, the war highlighted, in South Africa like in Europe, the bankruptcy of bourgeois nationalism and labor reformism. There were rebellions among various sectors of the South African population on the eve of the war.

In 1913 there were uprisings and strikes of Indian workers across Kwazulu-Natal. They struck in the mines and cane fields, railways and shops. Mahatma Gandhi, who had been in South Africa since 1893, pleaded for passive resistance. Nevertheless, the cane workers clashed with the police and workers were beaten and killed. Gandhi made an agreement with the government during the Natal uprisings, and called off the struggle of Indian workers with few gains.

On the Rand, in 1913 and 1914, the white gold miners led general strikes and the government killed over 20 workers. In Cape Town, 600 “colored” (mixed-race) stevedores struck for an 8-hour day and wage increases. The misleaders of the workers and oppressed were busy lining up support for the first inter-imperialist war on the side of the British overlords of South Africa, where more than 200,000 workers, nearly half of them black, fought in World War I; and more than twelve thousand died for British imperialism.

Fight Reformism Today!

In South Africa, unfortunately the reformist trade unions for the past twenty years have been organizing strikes premised on maintaining capitalism. Cosatu, the biggest trade union federation has been instrumental in strangling genuine and militant strikes by workers. The Cosatu misleaders have subordinated workers through their tripartite alliance with the bourgeois nationalist ANC and the revisionist South African Communist Party (SACP).

Workers in South Africa are beginning to see these lies for what they are. We have seen these betrayals by unions resulting in workers losing jobs. A similar situation exists in another plant in Uitenhage, Volkswagen South Africa (VWSA) where a big number of workers (1300) lost their jobs in the year 2000. The union leaders sided with the bosses in crushing the strike. Recently, a massive militant strike by a teachers union, South African Democratic Teachers Union (SADTU), demanding better pay was crushed by Cosatu because they saw the strike as embarrassing to the ruling ANC party. The teachers union suspended the strike indefinitely, resulting in the disillusionment and divisions in the teachers union.

There are serious divisions in the trade union federation manifesting themselves in two main factions. One faction is led by the biggest affiliate Numsa (National Union of Metalworkers of South Africa). This faction is calling for Cosatu to break away from the tripartite alliance and those opposed to the move. Even within the affiliates themselves these divisions are apparent. The class collaborationist politics in S.A. advanced by the tripartite alliance are an attack on the workers and the poor.

The class collaborationist tendencies in most countries all over the world lead, more often than not, to the killings of the workers. These are typical examples of popular fronts. This happens when workers support a bourgeois political/movement; when the bourgeois party wins in the elections, it ditches workers. As a



governing party it comes up with policies that are anti-workers. In South Africa today we are witnessing class collaborationist betrayals by the bourgeois ANC. Workers organized in their trade-union federations have become vulnerable. Cosatu has been paralyzed, weakened to such an extent that it is unable to implement its own resolutions, programs and campaigns. It has become a toothless bulldog.

This class collaboration and reformist policies have opened workers' eyes to look for the only alternative offered by the International Communist Workers Party (ICWP). The path of ICWP to build political strikes for communist power and not for reform is catching the imagination of the workers here like wild fire. Slowly but surely we are building the foundation of communist revolution. The distribution of *Red Flag* in various ways, writing for the *Red Flag* and studying, translating *Mobilizing the Masses for Communism* are among the ways we are building the party. Forward to Communist Revolution.

VENEZUELA: STATE CAPITALISM CAN'T MEET WORKERS NEEDS! WE NEED COMMUNISM!

The recent confrontations between the police and anti-Chavista groups in Venezuela reveal a tense struggle for the control of oil between the US imperialists and their equally imperialist Chinese and Russian rivals. The existing contracts that the government and the richest man in Venezuela have with China have enraged the US imperialists. They have created constant chaos in every part of the world where the Russian and Chinese bosses have interests: Iraq, Libya, Sudan, Syria, Venezuela, the Ukraine.

In this vein, the anti-Chavista bosses' sector, supported by the US empire, has declared an economic war and organized student street protests against President Nicolas Maduro and his politics of 21st Century Socialism. The student protests in 2014 resulted in eighteen deaths and many arrests, including that of opposition leader Leopoldo López, accused of inciting the violence. The lack of products such as milk, chicken and toilet paper is due to a boycott by the bosses who refuse to import these products as a way of putting pressure on the government.

On the other side, President Maduro rests securely on a base of enormous popularity among the poorest masses, the great majority, who have received a few more crumbs

from the bonanza of enormous oil profits. At the same time, up to this point, he has also been able to count on the total support of the army, which has received and controls a large part of these oil profits. According to Joshua Goodman of the Associated Press, “Maduro has placed more than 300 uniformed or retired officials in political positions, including one fourth of the cabinet....He has also increased soldiers' pay considerably.”

The Chavista leaders represent the current government of Maduro. This government is using the socialist idea that state control of the economy, according to them, allows them to control the prices of products and thus avoid a higher level of inflation. But in 2013, inflation reached 54%. That year, they sent soldiers to control the stores of the domestic electronic company Daka. They organized workers to participate in an auction of confiscated merchandise, but the thousands of people stormed the store in Valencia (in the center of the country), and looted the store. Among the looters were soldiers and police.

The Chavista government is a caricature of state capitalism. It has to ask permission to try to control the prices of the strongest business sectors, such as food, textile, shoes, toys and cars. This group of businessmen

are the ones that control part of the country, and they demand that private property in the means of production and exploitation be respected.


This internal rivalry is a reflection of the rivalry between the imperialists on a worldwide level. The government, faced with the possibility of having problems with the US market, which it accuses of being the instigators of a possible coup d'état, is seeking the support of UNASUR, the Union of South American Nations.

Destroy the profit system.

The working class shouldn't follow liberal leaders who promote the illusion that capitalism can be improved, giving us a few crumbs of the great wealth that a few people enjoy, nor to opposition politicians who are open defenders of exploitation.

There's no solution to controlling prices. To eliminate poverty, there's only communist revolution.

In a communist society, there won't be prices; we will eliminate everything that has to do with any form of monetary interchange. There won't be banks, money, stock exchanges, big or small businesses. Everything produced by the workers will be for the benefit of the workers. Production and distribution will be organized by the workers. If we need houses, we'll make more houses; if we need more rice or beans we'll concentrate on sowing these crops. Power will be in the hands of all, not only in the hands of a small group who makes the decisions about our lives. Join ICWP.



Politics and Math Education – Part 1

DON'T COUNT ON CAPITALISM

“Rocky invests \$50,000 in bonds and stocks...”
 “A piggy bank contains dimes and quarters...”
 “How much will a \$3000 TV cost if you get a 15% discount?”

Such typical math problems are supposedly “relevant” but they are only relevant (and class-biased!) in today’s capitalist world. What young people really need to learn is to fight for a world without money – a communist world of sharing.

Some teachers make up problems using real-world data to expose how vicious capitalism is:

“The CEO of Yum Brands gets \$3,280,352 per year. A Pizza Hut worker gets \$7.50 per hour and works 25 hours per week. Find the ratio of the CEO’s pay to that of the worker.”

More profound math problems can explore racism, rates of exploitation, and more.

Such problems can open up discussions and help identify students who are most open to communist ideas. However, students know that this is not the “real” curriculum because political questions are not on the test. And what else is supposed to matter in school?

“Why do I need to learn this?”

Some aspects of mathematics (proportional reasoning, formulas) are actually used on the job or in daily activities like cooking or sports. Most school math isn’t.

Math teachers often say that studying mathematics develops critical thinking, logical reasoning and the ability to work with abstractions. It can and should, but not as it’s usually taught.

Most math textbooks are organ-

ized into chapters and sections, each with a list of “objectives.” Each subsection mainly consists of “step by step” worked examples and boxes with “rules.” Long pages of exercises are variations on the examples. If any mathematical system, logic, or purpose connects these isolated topics into a coherent whole, it’s a closely-guarded secret.

Students are supposed to learn “the steps” for each type of problem. Sometimes they lose “credit” if their work and answer are mathematically correct but don’t follow “the steps.” Thus mathematical reasoning is discouraged. The true lesson is to follow instructions.

This isn’t how math is taught to the children of the ruling-class!

Working-class students “need to learn this” in preparation for routine jobs where they’ll be shown how to do a task, and then do that task over and over again, whether operating a machine, flipping burgers, or filing papers. The boss “thinks,” the worker follows instructions.

Workers are only supposed to think “critically” about how to do the job the boss gives them.

Likewise, math students are only supposed to think “critically” about what set of “steps” to use for problems posed by the book or the teacher.

Math education in capitalist schools trains us for the capitalist workplace. It reinforces the idea that we should let a few people decide what we must do, even when they’re deciding how best to exploit us for their own profits.

“What is it used for?”

A community college Algebra teacher asked groups of students to make up questions (not necessarily mathematical questions) using information given in story problems. Some asked factual questions like the ones they’ve often seen, where the answer could be underlined in the given information. But others rose to the occasion.

For example, one problem described a chemist mixing a weak acid solution with a stronger solution to get a medium-strength solution. “Is it safe to mix them?” one asked. “What is she going to use it for?” wondered another.

Our communist party ICWP needs thousands and millions of workers, young and old, who think about what’s safe and what’s useful for our international working class. Who can analyze the quantitative as well as qualitative aspects of things. Who can learn and teach and develop the theory and practice of communism.

They won’t learn all this in capitalist classrooms, even those few with communist teachers. It must take place as we mobilize for communism in the class struggle now and in the classless society of the future.

You’re never too young to learn about communism

During a conversation among a group of MTA mechanics, one worker was complaining that his children didn’t appreciate the luxury which, according to him, they enjoyed. “They eat three or more times a day and have the privilege of choosing their clothes and sleeping in five hundred dollar beds,” and he went on listing the luxuries and privileges which, in his opinion, his kids had and didn’t appreciate.

Then he continued, “I, on the other hand, went hungry. I was the youngest of six siblings in a very poor family. When things went well, we ate once a day, and what we ate was bean soup in which the beans were notable for their absence. With the soup there were one or two tortillas which we had to wait in line for, because a cooked—or half cooked—tortilla had no opportunity to see the light of day before it was devoured by an army of hungry and ragged children of the free world. After dinner was pure torture; my poor mother gave us a little piece of raw sugar and told us to sleep on our stomachs, so we wouldn’t feel hungry. We slept on the floor. Times were hard,” he concluded.

This is a brief version of what millions of immigrants have lived through, better and worse cases, since thousands and thousands don’t survive and die of poverty. But what’s even worse is that there are still millions of families who are struggling in poverty and instead of living, die every day clutching their stomachs to survive and continue an indefinite torture.

This is democracy and the free world that the bourgeoisie preaches about so much as the best of all systems. How many hopeful voices

are raised asking for changes, and the bosses’ class responds with jail, torture and bullets. How much longer will we let this circus continue, where the big thieves, torturers and murderers are respected persons and the workers, those who grow the basic food, build the houses, make the clothes, are considered to be nothing?

It may be true that some of our children have had access to things that everybody should have. But that doesn’t imply that they’re immune, they and their children, to a life of poverty and imperialist wars in the future, especially these days, when the economic and political world crisis is sharpening.

The lesson is obvious. It’s not about teaching our kids to be thankful or to value and appreciate what they have, but to teach them communist ideas so they come to the conclusion of the important necessity of joining ICWP to build a new communist society. During the farmworkers' strike in the 1970's in California that lasted for five years, while the striking workers fought in the fields against scabs and bosses, the pacifist leader César Chávez was going around behind the politicians asking them to do him the favor of supporting the cause. That is how he spent his time and the strike did not win. This led

to strikers becoming annoyed and tired of following the pacifist and defeatist politics of Chávez; they began to commit acts against the growers' property and against the scabs. Chávez hypocritically denounced these acts publicly as vandalism, but in private he was glad that they happened.

Three years after winning the strike, we had practically lost what we had won in five years of striking, and the bosses recovered what they had lost in concessions to the workers in the contracts. That is how reforms are under capitalism.

There is a saying, "From the frying pan into the fire." Millions of people go from one country to another looking for a better life than the one in their country of origin, which is unbearable.

For example, many working people continually come to the United States, some "illegally" and others "legally" supposedly to become citizens. Television Review:



The reality show "Cops" has been on TV for over 25 years. They describe their experiences growing up in areas similar to those they patrol and talk about how they joined the force to "clean up the streets." Every episode starts with police responding to a disturbance at a home, which ends in arrest for the "bad guys," usually poor and/or minorities.

The bosses create shows like these to try to fool workers into believing that police are heroes and that we need them to maintain order in society. The police aren't our heroes. They serve to protect the ruling class. That the "bad guys" are depicted as deviant only takes us further away from the real questions. What type of system leads people to steal, sell and abuse drugs, join gangs, and resort to prostitution?

The answer is capitalism, and exploiting people's lives for entertainment is disgusting. All crimes known today are products of the pressure felt to survive under capitalism. In a communist society, we won't need cops because most crimes will vanish when we destroy capitalism. We will work together to solve our problems and support one another. The ICWP is the only law enforcement we'll need.

They arrived at the space station, and after a big fight and the death of the worker, they were finally able to reboot the space station. When the system was rebooted, it identified everyone on earth as a citizen, and sent thousands of curing chambers to Earth to cure millions of sick citizens.
